Description:

In this international workshop, talks will be given on a broad range of topics that can loosely be tied together under the common theme "phonetic variation across and within languages". Phonetic variation, i.e., changes in the phonetic realization of an utterance, can take place in many forms: it may happen within a particular language in different phonological or discourse contexts, it may happen across languages when a word is borrowed into another language as a loanword, and it may happen when a non-native speaker with different proficiency levels tries to produce or perceive words in a second language. Phonetic variation may also occur at many levels, e.g., at the segmental or prosodic level. Talks in this workshop will address these issues surrounding phonetic variation from a variety of perspectives, using data from various languages.
